

It is with great excitement to have spring 2023 arrive. Not only do we have the arrival of warmer weather, new life springs up. We also have the resurrection of an in person CWL Annual Convention celebrating our 100th Anniversary. Although technically, in Peterborough Diocese, our CWL 100th Anniversary took place two years ago, we will celebrate 100 years just as many parish councils are marking this key point in time. One can find highlights of these anniversaries, along with other CWL events in Peterborough Diocese, in the upcoming Ontario Provincial Council CWL April newsletter.

Information about our upcoming convention can be found in the invitation 2023 Annual Convention Invitation - Google Docs. One can register for the convention and meals 2023 Annual Convention - Google Forms. If one registered early for the convention, and only needs to order meals, one can do so through 2023 Annual Convention Meals - Google Forms. Overall, the convention should be exciting. CWL Ontario Provincial President Linda Squarzolo will speak on Saturday about the "Go Make a Difference!" project and Indigenous Parishes. Father Peter Lukow will speak on Sunday "Be Encouraged. Be Renewed," as we all need encouragement and renewal from time to time. Council presidents, please remember to invite your Spiritual Advisor and priests to convention.

To celebrate our 100th anniversary, councils are invited to display pieces of their history in the form of a display board or photo album. Father Neil Pereira will speak at the banquet Saturday evening on the convention theme based on Micah 6:8 "Act Justly, Love mercy, Walk humbly with your God", related to our diocesan theme of "One Step, One Day, One Prayer at a Time." Councils are also invited to share their creativity and artistic talents at our banquet in the form of entertainment. We will also have some musical entertainment at our banquet as Bob Robertson will provide dinner music.

Within the Province of Ontario, CWL members, through their councils and diocese, were asked to carry out "Go Make a Difference!" projects. I am encouraging councils, within Peterborough Diocese, to have a deeper engagement with Indigenous Peoples in the Province of Ontario, in the form of action through corporal and/or spiritual works of mercy. These actions could include the following offerings that fit within the budgetary constraints of councils:

- a) donations of prayer shawls, lap quilts, knitted or crocheted items or supplies needed to make such items
- b) food items for baking or school snacks/lunches
- c) puzzles, games, arts and crafts items new or gently used children 's
- d) clothing

- e) forms of prayer
- f) school supplies
- g) sports equipment
- h) other agreed upon suggestions.

I have confirmed contacts in Attawapiskat and Fort Hope, as well as other possible contacts in Peawanuck, Fort Albany, Manitoulin Island and Thunder Bay diocese. Our first batch of items collected for Go Make a Difference! by CWL Peterborough Diocese, will begin at convention. Onwards, I will be the contact point between Indigenous parishes participating with CWL councils in Peterborough Diocese until July 2024 when the project officially concludes. Hopefully, connections made can continue so that we can continue to make a difference.

Proceeds from our auction at convention will support our "Go Make a Difference!" project. Members and councils are encouraged to donate items towards the auction, coordinated by Anna Marie Bolin of Our Lady of the Assumption Parish, Otonabee/Keene. It would be appreciated if they could be dropped off to St. Peter's High School on Friday afternoon when the set up for convention will be happening. Please bring cash with you to convention to support the auction and to make a difference!

There will also be a collection at our closing mass on Sunday which will support Indigenous reconciliation. Funds will be forwarded to the Truth and Reconciliation Fund with Peterborough Diocese. One can also donate online to the Truth and Reconciliation Fund Donate Now - Diocese of Peterborough (canadahelps.org).

It has been an honour and a pleasure to represent Peterborough Diocesan Council of the CWL, and to serve on the Ontario Provincial Council as your president of Peterborough Diocese. While there has been much work to do, there has been a lot of fun and laughs shared. Every woman I know, or have met, within the diocese, and within the province, has talents generously shared, unique personalities appreciated, and love for the League.

Congratulations to the councils who completed the annual parish report survey in December. In preparing a new survey for 2022, National responded to your concerns that reports were too long and confusing.

While many councils were apprehensive about completing this survey in a new format, once completed, everyone agreed that, they were more brief, specific and user friendly than past surveys. Councils appreciated completing them as an executive group as opposed to individual convenor submissions. Several were concerned that, since COVID had limited their activities, they had very little to report. However, national, aware of all your challenges, appreciated your honest responses. Diocesan Officers compiled your results and all were forwarded to the Ontario Organization Committee to prepare to forward to national. Thank you for your participation!

Thank you to the councils who submitted parish annual reports, a summary of pins presentations and a list of the organizations supported for inclusion in the Annual Report Book. This report book will be available to everyone at the 2023 Convention April 29-30 at St. Peter's Secondary School, Peterborough.

Thank you to councils for adjusting to the fee increase – the first since 2013. Through the process, as demonstrated in the new survey structure, all members in Canada witnessed their power in action. Each council, through an instructed vote, was invited to vote on the national proposal. At the Peterborough Diocesan 2022 convention, Peterborough Diocese councils, by one vote, voted to accept the increase. In response to the concerns voiced, a motion was passed at the Fall meeting, that the Peterborough Diocesan Council will waive the Diocesan fee (\$5.00) for each member in 2023 **only**, to assist those councils which cannot raise the funds to cover the increase.

As the five year strategic planning implementation continues, this year the main focus will be on the restructuring of council executives by 2024. Once each council has completed the 2022 -2023 elections, the new structure must be in place. The new structure- including our Diocesan Council after convention, will include

and three **committee chairpersons**, one each for the core values of **Faith**, **Service** and **Social Justice**. The core committee chairpersons will form committees to combine each of the previous convenorships. This will address the overlap of activities in the former structure. Ladies, have no fear. Ladies, together we will achieve this goal in 2023 with the implementation of our theme *one prayer*, *one day*, *one step at a time!*

Thank you for your support during my term, and I look forward to my upcoming term.

I Remember, by Madeline Pearson

In the last few months, we have lost two of our Life Members – Erica Perk and Elizabeth Condon. These ladies were true and strong CWL members.

Erica was born in Switzerland and came to Canada in her teens. She met and married Fred Perk, moved to a farm in Ida, and raised five children.

Erica joined the Millbrook Catholic Women's League and worked her way up through several positions to become the Parish President. In 1992, she became the Peterborough Diocesan President and held this office for 2 years. I recall going to the Provincial Convention in Sudbury with Erica. She packed her car with many of the necessities, for example an electric kettle and toaster. Erica was a proficient president and a pleasure to work and travel with. Erica excelled as a mentor to her fellow CWL sisters. She truly loved the League and her wishes for all ladies to enjoy it, and move through the different positions, was always front and centre. Even though Erica had limited access to attending meetings and such in her later years, she stayed in touch with the different activities and policies, always asking questions to keep herself up to date. Erica had two additional passions, the rosary and walking. She said the rosary several times a day. Even after her stroke, she

insisted in forcing herself to walk. If the weather was inclement, she walked in the halls of her apartment building. She spent her final years in a senior's home in Orangeville near her daughter. Erica loved her visits when we drove up to visit. During her final months, Erica was working on a CWL project she had been requested to do, and excited to do. She was true inspiration of what a CWL sister is, and should be. Erica passed away in August of 2022.





Elizabeth was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia. There, she had deep roots in the Catholic Women's League. Her grandmother Hagen formed the first provincial C.W.L. in Nova Scotia and became its first president. Her grandmother was also a sculptor. She made and hand-painted a set of dishes, which she donated to the League as a fundraiser. Elizabeth was proud to have a cup and saucer from this set and spoke of it often.

Elizabeth came to Peterborough at a young age where she met her husband Leonard and lived for many years in St. Anne's Parish, raising her four children. She joined the Catholic Women's League and worked her way through several positions to become President. In 1994 Elizabeth became the Diocesan President. During this year, the Provincial Convention was held in Peterborough. She also was a wonderful mentor to less experienced members, always willing to help out and share your skills.

Because Elizabeth didn't drive, she and I did a fair bit of travelling together. During her two years in office, she and I also flew to Winnipeg to a National Convention. We were privileged to have Elizabeth as a member of St. Patrick's Kinmount C.W.L. when the St. Anne's Council became inactive and folded. Elizabeth passed away in February of 2023.

I strive to be a good mentor with all I do, especially with my CWL sisters. I hope you have found my involvement in the last two year helpful. I will continue to be available for whomever makes contact, and for whatever.
